Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It should be no surprise, for the Lord warned them from the beginning: to follow Christ, to live our Baptism, to be a Christian will not be a life of ease, peace, and abundance, but rather one of trouble and contradiction.

All the apostles and prophets found this to be true, coming even from those who claim (falsely) to have fellowship among the saints, as Jeremiah discovered. Having been beaten by Pashur the Temple priest for delivering God's prophetic Word to Israel, Jeremiah is in genuine anger and despair, lamenting that all he is given to say is "violence and destruction" (Jer 20:8). Having voiced his complaint, Jeremiah returns with a clear head to confess the wonderful truth that God is with him always, to strengthen and uphold him, for when we are at our weakest God's strength is most active (a most difficult truth to accept and to trust, especially during trials).

Jeremiah's complaint is echoed by all the faithful who have discovered the Christian life is nothing short of warfare between life and death. Because Jesus gave Himself to the defeat of the devil and our spiritual slavery by letting it all have its way with Him to the cross, all who believe are freed and made participants in newness of life by simple faith in this grace and mercy of God for us.

Jesus says three times today, "Do not be afraid." Though we may often repeat the prophet's complain, we also rejoice with him and with all the saints of heaven: "Sing to the Lord! Give praise to the Lord!"

SECOND READING

Romans 6:12–23

¹²Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. ¹³Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness. ¹⁴For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

¹⁵What then? Are we to sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! ¹⁶Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? ¹⁷But thanks be to God, that you who were once slaves of sin have become obedient from the heart to the standard of teaching to which you were committed, ¹⁸and, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. ¹⁹I am speaking in human terms, because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to lawlessness leading to more lawlessness, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness leading to sanctification.

²⁰When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. ²¹But what fruit were you getting at that time from the things of which you are now ashamed? The end of those things is death. ²²But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the fruit you get leads to sanctification and its end, eternal life. ²³For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

SOME FINAL THOUGHTS FROM YOUR PASTOR

Brothers and sisters,

Happy Father's Day to our heavenly Father – Happy Father's Day, Abba!

And happy Father's Day to all the kinds of fathers we have this side of glory – to our dads, to those noble men who are father-figures to us, and to our "fathers" in government (right now they are all having a tough go of it—may God grant them the courage and wisdom to exercise the office aright).

I forget what we normally do after service for this day but I think it involved ice cream! Yummy! I might need to sneak out of quarantine and pick up something (I *love* cookie-dough ice cream). ©

Back when I was the Director of Donor Marketing for Catholic Charities of Denver, I always put an advertisement in the *Denver Catholic Register* (the diocesan newspaper, akin to a local *LCMS Reporter*) wishing all of the Fathers (priests) a happy Father's Day. Obviously (knowing my rather dry sense of humor) I always got a little chuckle from the play on words . . . but there is a certain truth to it also.

Now, hold off on grabbing the pitchforks and storming the castle because I sound like a Romanist (I say mostly in jest ©). While the vast majority of congregations in our Synod refer to their pastor as, well, "Pastor," there *are* congregations that refer to their pastor as "Father." . . . and either one is okay. Actually, there is a whole host of names one can use with ordained clergymen: Pastor, Reverend, Preacher, Father . . . Hey You (okay, the last one is just a joke but it still works in a pinch.)

As I said, there is a certain truth to calling your pastor Father for he is the one to whom God has entrusted the care of your soul (much as our heavenly Father has entrusted the care of children, body and soul, to his or her earthly fathers). Saint Paul often uses the example of fatherhood in relation to the Divine Office (cf Philemon 1:10; Philippians 2:22; 1 Thessalonians 2:11-12; 1 Timothy 5:1-2), even going so far as to say that he is a "father in Christ" to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 4:15). You could also check out the Large Catechism in its treatment of the Fourth Commandment. \odot

And on Father's Day, especially taking place on a Sunday, I chuckle thinking about being a father in two ways—as a pastor and as Dad to Leo and Sam (and Mr. Chan, if we count kitty-cats as family). Remember how Holly went into labor with Leo during the Call Service at Seminary, how I jetted out of the service dressed in my clerical collar? Well, when I went to pick up the car from the valet the next morning, the attendant addressed me as Father, to which I said, "In spirit *and* in truth!" Sadly, I don't think that poor fellow understood the humor of my response . . . but I laughed enough for both of us. \odot
