¹⁸For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. ¹⁹For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. ²⁰For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of Him who subjected it, in hope ²¹that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. ²²For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. ²³And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. ²⁴For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? ²⁵But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

SOME FINAL THOUGHTS FROM YOUR PASTOR

Brothers and sisters,

Endless monotony . . . that's what this quarantine is starting to feel like. And I'm not just talking about each day feeling more or less like a personal version of the movie "Groundhog Day." (though without the regular schedule of work and social engagements, no one day feels different than another).

The news hasn't changed; it's just an endless stream of COVID-19 updates, reports about riots, civil unrest, and historical figures being cast into the dustbin of history. Now with the El Centro summer heat . . . well, every day is starting to feel the same, inside and out. Have you started to feel the same way?

Saint Paul's words in today's epistle reading brought me comfort—not the part about the "sufferings of this present time [not being comparable to] the glory that is to be revealed to us" (Rom. 8:18), though that is a beautiful reality to behold. It was actually the part about *groaning* . . . because that word is such an apt description for today's events *and* such an apt description of how I've been feeling.

Saint Paul writes, "For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies" (Rom. 8:22-23).

So the world and each of us—yes, even us Christians who are supposed to be happy and joy-filled all the time, with no worries about this world because JESUS (at least that is how it feels like popular culture expects to be)—groans and struggles and sometimes feels crushed.

But you know who also groans? The Holy Spirit! "Likewise the [Holy] Spirit helps us in our weakness. . . . the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words" (Rom. 8:26).

And this is not pointless groaning or useless complaining; these are the groanings of childbirth—the sorrow and anguish that precede immeasurable and unimaginable joy! . . . but we have to get through the groanings and we will get through the groanings (maybe not unscathed) by the grace of God.

In the meantime, let's help each other through these "groanings." It's been a long time since we've been able to gather face-to-face and to look each other in the eye and say, "How are you? Are you okay? I love you. Let me help." It might be a while before we can do this in person—so let's do this on the phone! Dig out your old Member Directory this week and give someone a call, maybe even someone you don't usually talk with, and just say, "Hi! How are you doing? I love you and I miss you."

One thing that's really helped me is being able to see and talk with some of you in *real-time* during our Tuesday Bible Study. So please join me for our **Study of the Psalms** on "Zoom" **every Tuesday at Noon (ending by 1:00pm)**. We socialize for the first 15 minutes and work through the psalm from 12:15pm to 12:45pm, concluding by 1:00pm. This week we study Psalm 13.
